22nd BIENNIAL REPORT:

The President and the committee have great pleasure in placing before you the Report of the Association for the Biennial period ended 31st March, 1998.

MEMBERSHIP:

We have as on date 442 Life Members and 146 Ordinary Members. The Membership growth has been steady due to the efforts of the members.

MEETINGS:

The Second Sunday Meetings of the Members of our Association were held regularly at the Philatelic Bureau, Anna Road Head Post Office without a break whether it rained or shined. The attendance was good sometimes touching more than 50 members. At every meeting new members introduced themselves and many of our members came up with their display and gave short talks on them.

DISPLAY AT PHILATELIC BUREAU:

Our Members took special efforts to put Display in about 5/10 Frames of their collections. Special mention must be made of the efforts of our Secretary Mr. J. Rolands Nelson who has put in about 8/4 Stamp Frames on Cathedrals and Churches alongwith Mrs. P. Thomas during the Stamp Release Function of St. Andrews church at Egmore, inaugurated by Shri M.K. Stalin, Worshipful Mayor of Chennai. It was greatly appreciated by one and all present.

During the 50 years of India's Independence our Members Shri, G. Amarchand: Shri G. Balakrishnadas: Shri, G. Madan Mohan Das put on display "Freedom Fighters" in the spacious Hall of Anna Road Head Post Office in nearly 30 frames for public viewing. The same was inaugurated by the veteran Congress Freedom fighter Shri R.R. Dalavai and all efforts of our Chief Postmaster General Shri S.T. Bhaskaran is really praiseworthy. Mr. Rolands Nelson egged on by the Chief Postmaster General and also at in liative a three frame exhibit on British Personalities was put up at British Council Library for nearly a fortnight. It was inaugurated by the British High Commissioner in Chennai. Wide coverage was given in media and T.V. for all the functions.

Again during the Children Day 14.11.1997, our ever active vigilant Secretary Sri. C.S. Sankaranarayanan put in five frames Children Day Display in three frames and in two frames CHACHA NEHRU FAMILY in the Anna Road HPO for viewing by the public for nearly 10 days. Thomas for the untiring efforts to put in on Display in five/seven Frames Christmas & Easter and also in motivating Anglo Indian Higher Secondary School to bringing in Special Catchet for the Centenary of the St. Joseph's Higher Secondary School at Vepery and a Special Cover was also brought out on the occasion.

Ever vigilant active Member Shri J. Rolands Nelson took great pains and efforts to put on display Christmas during December, 1997. It was a grand display and was appreciated by one and all during their visit to Anna Road HPO Hall.

During the Republic Day - 26.01.1998 again our Secretaries Shri J. Rolands Nelson and Shri. C.S. Sankaranarayanan put on display in about ten frames Mahatma Gandhi Apostle of Non Violence.

All these displays were due to the persistent efforts of Miss. Radhika Doraiswami, Postmaster General (Metro) under the able guidance of Mr. S.T. Bhaskaran Chief Post Master General, Tamilnadu Circle of Posts. Shri. S.T. Bhaskaran who was allout for the promotion of philately, took great pains in allocating sufficient funds for the renovations of the Heritage Building and saw to it that the Philatelic Bureau was shifted there. Our special thanks are due to him due to our Association's persistent efforts in having a Special Philatelic Bureau Cancellation for the past many years culminated in Mr. S.T. Bhasakran, Chief Post Master General going all out in bringing out a Permanent Pictorial Cancellation of the Heritage Building of the Philatelic Bureau on 31.03.1998, before an august gathering at the Philatelic Bureau. But we are sad to say that the permanent Cancellation has not yet been put in vogue until this report. Hope the authorities will see that this lapse is rectified before long.

Our Association members must and has to take up seriously and see that the Tenth Circle Level Philatelic Exhibition due in 1998 is held before the first quarter of 1999. We are glad to inform that Circle Level Philatelic Advisory Committee was reconstituted with Shri. G. Balakrishnadas, our President and Shri. Ajit Chordia, Vice President, with four officials of the Department of Posts. A Meeting was called and it was decided to have Bimonthly Bulletin by the department on the lines of the Kerala Circle who have been doing for the past six years, to popularise and boost the philatelic activities of our Circle. The Service rendered by the Philatelic Bureau to the Account holders is really commendable and the courteous service at the counter is honoured by India praiseworthy. At this juncture we must say that due to the good offices of Miss. Radhika Doraiswami Post Master General 10 frames are allotted to our Association for display for our members for nearly a fortnight throughout the year. We are really grateful to the Department for this gesture of goodwill.

Raghavendra S. Pachapurkar alia Baba Raghav Das was an ascetic, reformer and freedom fighter who made significant contributions to social causes like National Unity, Harijan Welfare, Khadi & Village Industries and the Bhoodan Movement. Baba's life and achievements can be assessed best from the following words of Mahatma Gandhi: "If I can find a few saints like Raghav Das, I could easily win India's Independence."



Lt. Indra Lal Roy (1898-1918) was the one Indian Pilot who distinguished himself most in the First World War. At the age of 18 years he joined the Royal Flying Corps & obtained the King's Commission on July 5, 1917. A very gallant and determined officer, who in 14 days accounted for 10 enemy machines. He was posthumously awarded the coveted "DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS" (DFC).

Maharashtra has a great tradition of religious philosophers and social reformers for the last many centuries. Gadge Baba (1876-1956) truly carried forward the great tradition of Sant Tukaram, & Ekanath. The way Gadge Baba, himself at illiterate, held the masses spellbound with his oratory was amazing.

INDIAN MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS

200, 600, 800, 1000 P.



The evolution of the musical tradition of India can be traced through ancient manuscripts and visual depictions of musical instruments in sculptures and objects from archeological excavations. On the basis of sound produced by the instruments, they are classified into four main categories. (1) "Tata Vadya" or Chordophones - the sound is produced by the Vibrations & plucked by the fingers or a plectram by means of friction. Veena, Sarod, Santoor, Sitar, Tanpura are the examples of this category. (2) Sushira or Aerophones — the sound is produced by vibration of air. Sankha, Bansuri, Flute are the examples of this kind. (3) Avanaddha Vadya of Membranophones — the sound is produced by the vibrations of stretched skin. Pakhwaj, Tabla, Dholak, Mridang etc. are of this category. (4) The Ghana Vadya or Indiophones — the sound is produced by solids struck against each other. Gongs, Ghanta, Ghungroo etc. are of this category. Set of four stamps depicts Rudra Veena, Sarod, Pakhwaj and Bansuri, with a backdrop of panels from ancient stone carvings.

SEA SHELLS OF ANDAMAN AND NICOBAR ISLANDS (INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF THE OCEAN)

Sea Shells, perhaps the most beautiful and enchanting of all forms of marine life, are actually the protective external calcareous covering of a group of soft-bodied aquatic organisms called molluscs. In India the shells have traditionally been considered to have ritualistic significance in religious ceremonies. Set of four stamps has been issued on the occasion of International Year of the Ocean showing four different species found in Indo Pacific. (1) Cypraea staphlae, which measures up to 25 mm in sizes. (2) Cassis cornuta linnaeus, also known as Horned Helmet Shell. The size can be up to 350 mm. (3) Chicoreus brunneus linnaeus, commonly known as Rock Shell or Murex Shell. They live among rocks and coral in shallow water and grow up to a size of 70 to 80 mm. (4) Lambis lambis linnaeus, also known as Spider shell, found in tropical Indo Pacific. Its size can be up to 200 mm.

THE FAREWELL MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT, FIP

Times has come to say bid Adieu. This will be my last column under the Presidential page as my term ends at the close of 65th Congress to be held at Milan on 31st October/1st November 1998. I would have served 18 fruitful years in the FIP Board. First as a Director, then Vice-President and finally the last 8 years i.e. from 1990 from London Congress as your President.

The past 18 years have been consuming as well as rewarding and full of responsibility. It is a long innings and new faces and ideas are a welcome sign. Let me highlight some of the outstanding achievements worth recollecting during my period. The introduction of judging regulations for competitive exhibitors saw a revolution in the judging system making it more transparent. It helped both judges and exhibitors to see the situation correctly. It is heartening to see smooth adoption by all judges after initial hic-cup. I know quite a few judges harping strong resistance in introducing scoring sheet. Gradually they realised the usefulness of the same and adopted it.

The decision of Congress to check 1% of exhibits at FIP exhibitions for forgeries and fakes etc. at the London Congress and which necessitated to introduce the Expert

Teams presented many problems and several false starts. However, the system now introduced and maintained by the President of the Commission for forgeries seems to work well.

Other striking achievement that I take pride is the development of our relations with other International Philatelic and non-philatelic organisations. Never before have FIP come in such close contact as they do now with Universal Postal Union. Philately had no place in the realm of UPU but today all postal administrations look upon the philately into a totally different concept. A first major act was the establishment of the UPU Contact Committee for Philately now WADP (World Association for the Development of Philately) and FIP is working in close collaboration with the other members in compiling a Guide for the development of philately world-wide.

The healthier financial results has been encouraging. From a near empty coffer we now have seen a good turn around and by the year end would be closing near to one Million Swiss Franc mark. Similarly, the FIP foundation resources are also reassuring. Thanks goes to our members for better activity and generous donations. However, my

dream of FIP having its bwn headquarters still dither. At least we started with a "roof above our head" in 1985 and God willing one day the dream should be fulfilled.

Through this column I have been able to reach you, dear readers on numerous subjects and have been able to place before you the insight of thinking of FIP. That the column was effective can be gauged from frequent references drawn many a time. I am positive that my successor will follow the trend I have established to communicate with you.

It is but unfortunate that there would be a tie for the post of Presidentship which has not happened before. It is not a healthy sign. I feel I have played my roll very intelligently keeping in mind, at all times, the good of FIP and their members and above all the collectors.

During my tenure I have received very cordial support from fellow Directors and Commission Presidents at all times and the working has been very smooth. I do not know if our members realise that in Secretary General they have a living institution having performed her duties most delicately and sincerely. Really she is an asset for FIP.

Now, my dear members and readers, let me say Au revoir, as a President, I wish all of you the very best of health and spirit and god speed in your respective endeavours. I have tried my best along with my Board members and where we could not meet your expectation, it was certainly not due to lack of any efforts or lack of will on our part.

HOW TO GIVE THE EXHIBITORS A FAIR DEAL

An exhibitor faces a test. Like any academic test he has to satisfy the examiner, in this case the Jury. It is a practice now to mount the exhibits and expect the Jury to judge them during the Exhibition. Again like any other test it is the constraint of time, Judges spend a few minutes at each frame, that decides the exhibitor's fate. Mr. G.J. Elliot in one of articles says, this is not fair to either the Judge or the Exhibitor.

We have come to a stage when more and more time is being spent on the exhibit by the exhibitor and less and less time being spent by the jury members on judging it. Many exhibitors spend days and days of study and work in preparation of an exhibit, which follows years (only in case of purchasers, a few weeks) of effort in actually obtaining and selecting the material for display. Some jury members admit that there is too much information included on the album pages, and Jury members, in spite of the best will in the world, are forced to skip over the write up. Some traditionalists like only the philatelic items that too rare items, on display. More often the rare items come from the traditional collection and that means classics which are again the millionaire's purchases and not collections.

It is high time that we adopt a new approach to judging exhibits, in order to give the exhibitor a fair deal. Mr. Elliot cites the example of the Literature judging. Two or three copies of the Publication is required much prior to the Exhibition. The publications are supposed to be circulated to the selected members of the Jury, and a consensus is reached. The Chairman puts his seal of approval before the awards are made. That example is now also questioned in view of a large number of literature exhibits being received and less time available to the jury members to go through all the articles. They are often carried over by the get-up which again is a rich editor's fare and do not necessarily reflect good or research articles.

In the last few years there has been a change and an Exhibitor is required to present prior to the Exhibition a photo copy of the Introductory page. That however gives an inkling of what he shows but is more subjective as the exhibitors likely to praise his exhibits. Some suggest that a synopsis

should also be provided together with copies of ten of the best items, that is an improvement upon the skeleton approach we are now having.

If it is accepted that Judges have adequate time both for research of their own and for a better understanding of the Exhibit, I would agree with Mr. Elliot that photo copies of the complete Exhibit be provided to the organisers who would circulate these photo copies to the Specialist Judges for judging. Everything could be finalised before the Exhibition, except for Judging the Condition of the Material on Display. If there are any problems in judging any of the items like Presentation, Treatment, Importance, Knowledge, Research, Rarity from the photo-copies, necessary question marks may be indicated by the Judge that he or she verifies the points in the Exhibition hall. The doubts may be cleared with a reference to the description of the reason for selecting the subject and also the aims of the Exhibitor. The exhibitor could also list in some detail, significant items, recent purchases and additions since his last exhibition and copies of Expert Certificates could also be included.

Some exhibitor will complain, (indeed I have sometimes felt like complaining) that he/she couldn't get the exhibits ready in time. For any test at all. The Literature exhibitors have the same problem, but they have accepted the fact they have to submit entries much earlier. It just means that the organisers will have to start preparations earlier, after all, it will be the closing date for submitting entries, which will be the important date, as opposed to the Exhibition Date, Mr. Elliot argues.

In this respect we come across an opinion of Paul H. Jensen, R.D.P., President of the FIP Postal Commission, regarding the Postal History Judging at Finlandia '95 which echoes ours. He wrote an article in the Postal History Journal No. 102 October 1995, which inter alia says "One rather remarkable exhibit of early Peru Mail... was awarded only a Vermeil medal, but if the Jury had more time to review, a better medal level might have been reached".

Paul Jensen concludes... "I must say that in future specialised exhibitions one must either have more time or more Jury members."
